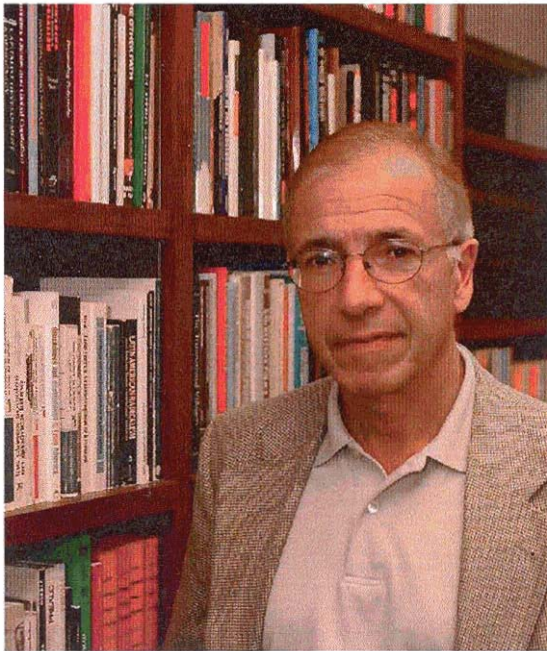

PRINCETON UNIVERSITY**



Alejandro Portes is the Howard Harrison and Gabrielle Snyder Beck Professor of Sociology and Director of the Center for Migration and Development at Princeton University. Born in Havana, Cuba, he received his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Portes is the author of numerous articles and chapters on national development, international migration, Latin American and Caribbean urbanization, and economic sociology. His award-winning books include: *City on the Edge – the Transformation of Miami* (1993), *Immigrant America: A Portrait* (1996), *Legacies: The Story of the Immigrant Second Generation* (2001), and *Ethnicities: Children of Immigrants in America* (2001). In his lecture, Dr. Portes will review the origins and principal characteristics of Latin American immigration, and the transforming impact it is having on the fabric of the nation. The shortcomings of current policy and alternatives that address the challenges posed by this flow will also be discussed.
